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FSM celebrates the inauguration of its leaders

Pohnpei, FSM—This morning's joint inaugural celebration was not for the purpose of swearing in new FSM leadership. That task was covered during previous sessions of Congress. This morning's inaugural festivities were a chance for FSM to celebrate itself and to formally welcome the new leadership.

On May 11, 2015 the members of the FSM's 19th Congress were seated and took their oaths of office. From amongst those Constitutionally voter selected members Congress selected Senator Peter Christian of Pohnpei to be the nation's eighth president and Yosiwo George to be the nation's eighth Vice President. Congress selected Senator Wesley Simina to be the sixth Speaker of

Congress.

All of the selected FSM National leaders took their oaths of office on that morning and a special election was held to fill the seats vacated by President Christian and Vice President George.

Senator David Panuelo won Pohnpei's vacated at-large seat. Former Vice President Alik Alik won Kosrae's seat. They took their oaths of office on July 7 during a special session of Congress that at press time was still in progress.

Pohnpei's two year seat for Election District three, vacated by Senator Panuelo after he won the at-large seat will be filled by the winner of yet another special election. At this morning's inaugural celebration in

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Salvage experts say grounded "Ping Da 7" is an environmental time bomb

Pohnpei, FSM—Two experts on marine salvage who visited Pohnpei two weeks ago claim that the Ping Da 7, the massive reefer ship that has been stuck hard aground on Pohnpei's reef for over a year and a half is an environmental time bomb waiting to go off.

Who is responsible for the wreck now is by all accounts uncertain.

The Chinese businessman who owned the Ping Da 7 essentially walked away from the vessel after it slammed into Pohnpei's northern reef in December of 2013. By all reports he declared financial insolvency. The insurance company that covered the vessel walked away as well.

On the government level, the problem of the vessel and whose responsibility it would be to remove it is confused for a variety of reasons. On one hand, it is sitting on Pohnpei's reef which could be interpreted to mean that the problem is one for Pohnpei State government to handle. On the other hand, the owner of the vessel is a foreign national, or at least he was until the FSM Department of TC&I was appointed as receiver for the vessel. Neither the fact that it is in the purview of the National Government nor the fact that TC&I was appointed as receiver combine to clearly point to the FSM National Government as the responsible entity.

An employee at TC&I said this afternoon that a task force was formed in order to deal with the situation but that he hadn't heard any conclusions "until now".

Meanwhile there simply is no money to deal with the environmental time bomb that is the Ping Da 7. And the clock is ticking. Incremental damage is being done to the reef and to the lagoon every moment that the huge ship sits on the reef.

Jaco Sluijmers of Mammoet Salvage, perhaps the world's largest and most expert marine salvage companies, and Captain Will Naden of Cabras Island Marine Services came to Pohnpei last year with an eye toward developing a salvage plan and presenting it to the FSM Government. They said that at that time the Ping Da 7 had been ransacked, that fuel and lube oil had been removed by a contractor, though not all of it. They found buckets and barrels of various oils lying around in the engine room and in barrels and some half emptied "day tanks". They found an ammonia room that had a large tank holding tons of pressurized liquid ammonia. At that time they found little material on the reef.

When they returned on June 27 this year they found junk thrown from the decks of the ship on to the reef including five gallon containers of paint that had spilled and "painted" the reef. They found considerably more corrosion to the fittings and tanks aboard the ship. Barrels were leaking on deck and the oil in them was leaking into the ocean. They found water tight hatches and doors that were rusted open. They still found the same oils and other pollutants they had found the first time they went aboard.

Naden and Sluijmers did a thorough evaluation of the hazards and the possibility for removing the ship from the reef. Their visit was unsolicited but they hoped to be able to provide to the relevant Governments, enough information so that those governments could use it in order to attract funding to get the job done. They want the job and they have the resources to do it.



Mammoet Salvage has over 5000 employees and 80 offices worldwide. They specialize in heavy lift engineering and performed vessel salvages all over the world including in Guam. Cabras Island Marine Services based in Guam has worked with Jaco Sluijmers of Mammoet on at least two large salvage operations in Guam. The FSM has called upon Captain Naden for his services as a marine consultant and surveyor several times.

The two said that scrapping the vessel in situ is not a viable alternative but that the hull appears to be sufficiently intact to remove the vessel from the reef in a manner that would not create severe environmental damage. Though there certainly is a salvage value for the metals in the massive vessel the cost to tow the vessel to a port where it could be recycled would be enormously expensive. Any money earned from recycling would likely be less than just the cost to tow the vessel and wouldn't even touch the cost of completely cleaning it to international standards and removing it from the reef. That operation will require large machinery and will be a feat of engineering marvel for which Mammoet is famous.

The best solution would be to remove all environmentally hazardous materials, thoroughly strip and clean the vessel to international environmental standards, remove it from the reef and sink it in deep water.

In addition to meeting with many government officials, while the two were on island they performed GPS positioning of 36 other wrecks in Pohnpei's lagoon. They said that since it would be necessary to bring equipment to the island if they get the contract to remove the Ping Da 7 that same equipment could be used to remove those 37 other wrecks which are also polluting Pohnpei's lagoon.

They said that the fiberglass wrecks are also an environmental hazard as they contain toxic lead, heavy metals, foam, and plastics that are breaking down and going into the food chain.

They said that they are hoping to get the interest of the local population in order to try to convince Pohnpei State to maintain the State of Emergency and to do what they can to convince the national government to seek aid.

In a posting on Micronesia Forum they wrote, "With the Ping Da 7 and 36 other wrecks sitting on your reefs and in the mangroves, Pohnpei has a compelling case to seek remediation and help. We can assist with securing funding only after a request is made."

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Nurse midwife saves baby's life after attending Pacific Partnership course

KOLONIA, Pohnpei (NNS) -- A Pohnpei nurse midwife credits the "Helping Babies Breathe" course taught during Pacific Partnership with helping her save a baby's life June 29, just hours after attending the two-day event.

Bernolina Hedson was a student in the course taught by Royal Australian Navy Lt. Cmdr. Alison Zilko and U.S. Navy Lt. Jenna DiMaggio June 29-30. Only nine hours after the completion of her first day of training, Hedson used her newly obtained knowledge to successfully resuscitate a newborn.

While delivering a baby, Hedson was surprised to find an undiagnosed twin pregnancy, with the other fetus still in utero and breech. Forty-five minutes later she delivered the second baby, who had a low heart beat and no spontaneous breathing. Hedson remembered the training from earlier that day and was able to successfully resuscitate the child within seven minutes,

just as the Helping Babies Breathe algorithm dictates.

"The first thing that popped into my mind after delivering the baby was to use the knowledge and skills learned earlier in the day for routine care of the newborn," said Hedson.

According to Hedson, the baby was spontaneously breathing after seven minutes and now is expected to make a full recovery and join his brother at their mother's side.

Helping Babies Breathe is designed to teach those who attend deliveries in austere environments to help babies breathe in the first crucial minutes of their lives.

This is the first time that the Helping Babies Breathe course is being taught in Pacific Partnership by U.S. and partner nation military personnel. On July 1-2, students trained other medical providers in the same course, as Helping Babies Breathe is also a train-the-trainer course.

"The course is designed to not only teach providers the principles of resuscitation, but also trains them to teach others the same material," said U.S. Army Lt. Col. Ashley Maranich, the master trainer for the course. "This allows the principles to be propagated throughout the resource-limited areas where it is intended to be used."

Hedson attested firsthand that Helping Babies Breathe can help save lives. She also vowed to continue to teach the course throughout the Federated States of Micronesia and other Pacific island countries.

Now in its tenth iteration, Pacific Partnership is the largest annual multilateral humanitarian assistance and disaster relief preparedness mission conducted in the Indo-Asia-Pacific Region. While training for crisis conditions, Pacific Partnership missions have provided medical care to approximately 270,000 patients and veterinary services to more than 38,000 animals. Additionally, Pacific Partnership has provided critical infrastructure developments to host nations through the completion of more than 180 engineering projects.

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High level envoy from Japan speaks on relations with FSM

Pohnpei, FSM—On the evening before the Joint Inauguration Celebration the Embassy of Japan hosted a reception they called "Japan Night" at the home of Ambassador Sakai. The reception was well attended by FSM leadership including the President, Vice President, Speaker, several members of Congress, and Governors of FSM states.

Special guest speaker during the evening's festivities was Mr. Keiji Furuya who was personally appointed by Japan's Prime Minister Shinzo Abe to represent the Government of Japan during the FSM joint inauguration celebration.

As the reception was winding up Mr. Furuya, who has served in Japan's Parliament for over 25 years sat for an interview. He told us that he is the President of two Parliamentary Friendship Leagues. One of them is the Japan FSM Friendship League and the other is the Japan Pacific Island Countries Friendship League.

"Japan and Micronesia, historically have a very close relationship," he said through his interpreter. "Also Japan has strong ties with Pacific Island countries. We think this region is very important for Japan in terms of the marine fisheries resources."

He reminded us that during the 7th Pacific Area Leaders Meeting (PALM 7) held in Japan on May 22 and 23 that the Japan Parliamentary Friendship Leagues conducted several events and projects. One of those was to double the number of trainees including exchange students from the region over the next three years from

2000 to 4000. Additionally the intention is to make the program stronger in terms of content.

"One of the goals of the program is to make supporters of Japan and to develop good human resources in this region", he said. "...That will contribute to the two countries' relationship and friendship further...I think that people are the most important resource in the region."

The second point he wanted to make during his interview regarded continuing grant aid and financial assistance. He said that on the 8th of July Japan and the FSM signed an agreement for 400 million yen in financial support, over \$3 million at today's exchange rate. He also reminded us that during the PALM 7 Prime Minister Abe announced 55 billion yen (nearly \$444 million) in assistance in the region for helping in such areas as Climate Change and disaster management.

He spoke of the challenges that both FSM and Japan face as island countries in terms of dealing with natural disasters and reminded us of the earthquake and tsunami that struck Japan and killed almost 20,000 people. He said that Japan has introduced a proposal at the United Nations to establish a World Tsunami Day in an effort to establish a worldwide cognizance of the importance of early warning systems and preparedness. He said that Japan is asking for the support of 14 Pacific Island nations in the U.N. for their initiative and said that the leaders had expressed support during PALM 7.

"I have one story from the March 11 earthquake," he said. "There was one Elementary School Principal who remembered what happened in 1960 when

a big earthquake hit Chile and the tsunami reached to Japan and killed many people. When he noticed that the sea level was lowering he predicted that the tsunami would come so he evacuated all the children from the school to a higher place. Because of that effort, no one from that school was killed despite the fact that the four story school building was entirely flooded over the roof line because of the tsunami. If they had merely evacuated to the roof, the children would not have survived."

"Those kinds of experiences should be shared all over the world," he said.

His third talking point regarded cooperation between the FSM and Japan on marine fisheries resources.

"I discussed this issue with President Christian and also with Speaker Simina," he said and indicated that the meeting had been productive with both leaders indicating that they would consider the matter. "

"For Japan the issue is very important," he said. "Of the tuna consumed in Japan, 80 percent of it comes from this region."

He said that the issue is also very important to the FSM since the country would lose significant fishing and other fees if the Japanese fleet is forced to decide to fish elsewhere. The entire Japanese fleet did leave the FSM Exclusive Economic Zone shortly after the FSM pressed charges against three Japanese vessels. Charges on one of those vessels are still being heard at the FSM Supreme Court. He said that some vessels have since returned and are paying the proper and agreed upon fees to fish in the FSM's EEZ. "But it is certainly

true that the Japanese fishing industry is operating in fear because of that situation because they don't know when the next capturing of the ship will happen," he said.


"So what I discussed with President and Speaker was that it is important for both FSM and Japan to create a win-win situation," he said.

We told him that we have heard the sentiment expressed by several of Japan's citizens who were not necessarily speaking for the Japanese government, that perhaps Japanese aid should be curtailed for FSM until the fisheries matter is resolved. Yet Japan continues to provide aid to the FSM.

"Yes, that is why I said that Micronesia and Japan should develop a win-win situation," he concluded.

22 Pacific participants graduate from 2015 Executive Leadership Development Program

Twenty-two (22) participants from throughout the U.S. affiliated insular areas represented the 2015 graduating class of the Executive Leadership Development Program (ELDP).

ELDP graduation ceremonies were held on June 12, 2015 at the East-West Center in Honolulu, Hawaii. The ELDP is funded by the U. S. Department of Interior's Office of Insular Affairs and administered by the Graduate School USA's Pacific Islands Training Initiative.

The ELDP was designed to assist the insular areas with developing and retaining the qualified and skilled staff that will become the future leaders of their respective governments. Program participants met four times over the past year to further develop their skills in leadership, management, government finance, program management, public policy and fiscal reform.

ELDP participants represent the governments of American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, the Federated States of Micronesia, and the Republic of Palau.

The ELDP participants met over the past year for one week of training on Guam, American Samoa, the Republic of Palau, and Honolulu, Hawaii. During each phase of the program, participants heard from guest speakers that included Guam Governor Eddie B. Calvo, American Samoa Governor Lolo Matalasi Moliga, Palau President Tommy E. Remengesau and former Hawaii Governor John Waihe'e.

In addition to developing an Individual Development Plan, ELDP participants identified mentors who they met with throughout the year and took part in reading and group assignments between training sessions. A major component of the ELDP were group projects in the areas as health, education, the environment, finance and budgeting, commerce, and human resource management that the participants developed throughout the year and presented on the final day of the program

FSM participates in opening of Pacific Games

Port Moresby, PNG- After years of preparation by Papua New Guinea for thousands of Pacific regional athletes, the 15th Pacific Games opening ceremony was held Saturday night, July 4, in the nation's capital, Port Moresby.

TEAM FSM, from the Federated States of Micronesia, was one of 23 Pacific island countries and territories that marched at the opening ceremony. The flag bearer for TEAM FSM was famous Olympic weightlifter Manuel Minginfel, from Yap. TEAM FSM is composed of 42 athletes, coaches and manager competing in Weightlifting, Boxing, Swimming, Track and Field, Tennis and Soccer (Football).

Artistic director for the opening ceremony, Airleke Ingram said the opening ceremony

was a celebration of Papua New Guinea's rich cultural history while also pointing to the country's future direction. The sing-sing performance had a cast of 3,000 performers and almost 300 ceremony staff.

Prince Andrew, the Duke of York, Great Britain welcomed all 23 Pacific region island countries and territories. "I wish everyone two successful weeks of sport. Good luck to all the competitors. Congratulations, Port Moresby," he said.

On Monday, July 6, Minginfel, the FSM best hope of winning a medal, will compete in the men's 69kg Weightlifting category. Manuel's first appearance at a Pacific Games was at the Mini Games in Pago Pago in 1997. Since that time, he has competed in every single Pacific Games and Mini Games, winning a total of 19 gold medals and 5 silver medals.

2015 Pacific Games events began on Friday, July 03 and will continue until July 18.



FSM weightlifter Manuel Minginfel wins gold at Pacific Games

Port Moresby, PNG- A few hours ago in Port Moresby, PNG, Manuel Minginfel, famous Olympic weightlifter from Yap competed in his fifth Pacific Games (formally known as

the South Pacific Games). At age 37, he is the oldest athlete competing in Weightlifting at the games.

Minginfel completed in the 69kg division with 11 other lifters from Australia, New Zealand, Samoa, Fiji, PNG, Kiribati, Guam, Tuvalu and Nauru. This is the first Pacific Games that Australia and New Zealand have participated in.

Amazingly, Minginfel won 2 gold medals in the Snatch and Overall Weight, and a silver medal in the Clean & Jerk. His Snatch lift was 120kg, Clean & Jerk was 156kg and total weight was 276kg.

Minginfel has been training with world famous coach Paul Coffa for the past few months in New Caledonia at the Oceania Weightlifting Institute.

"The old man did it – he beat the young guns again", Coffa said after Minginfel won



FSM football team participates in Pacific Games

The FSM Men's Football Team finished playing in the preliminary round of the 2015 Pacific Games Football losing all 3 games to Tahiti, Fiji and Vanuatu. The FSM team had trained on Guam 2 weeks prior to travelling to PNG for the games.

The 2015 Pacific Games are being held in Port Moresby, PNG from July 04-18, 2015, with 28 sports being played and over 4000 athletes competing. The FSM is one of 24 island countries and territories, including Australia and New Zealand, competing in the games. TEAM FSM one of the smallest delegations with only 40 athletes and coaches is competing in Football, Weightlifting, Tennis, Boxing, Swimming and Track and Field.

The FSM Men's Football team comprised 18 soccer athletes from Yap, Chuuk and Pohnpei. The soccer athletes were: Mikson Kuka, Paulis Jeikek, Scott Rudolph, Roger Nakasone, James Macarthur, Ioane Kariti, Franson Simeon, Kacy Alton Olmos, Michael Reyes, Mark Jones, Jacob Nam, Dominic Gadad, Aaron Bayow, Jonathan Garayog, Devon Figirmow, Walter Pongkagnan, Benjiman Gilmoon and Javin Kognang. The head coach of the team is Stan Foster from Australia and assistant coach is Curtis Graham. The soccer athletes and coaches were selected by Coach Foster and the FSM Football Association.

This was the first international experience for the young FSM Football athletes. Most of the athletes are still in high school. The Football competition was also an Olympic Qualifier for the Rio 2016 Olympic Games. Thus, the best Football teams in the Pacific participated. Even though the

FSM Football team was dominated in all three games the athletes never gave up and they received the respect of the teams from Tahiti, Fiji, and Vanuatu. TEAM FSM is very proud of the hard work done by Coach Foster and our young athletes.

By competing in the games, the FSM Football Association hopes to become a member of FIFA (the international football association). The FSM was the only country in the north Pacific that sent a Football team to the Pacific Games. When the FSM joins FIFA in the near future our country will receive grants to renovate and build new soccer venues in the FSM, bring professional FIFA coaches to train the FSM athletes and receive needed equipment. Though the FSM Football team results at the Pacific Games were a disappointment, the future benefits from participating outweigh the results.

The FSM Football team members departed PNG on Sunday, July 12 and returned to the FSM.

The training camp on Guam was funded and organized by the FSM Football Association. The FSM National Olympic Committee applied for and received a special International Olympic Committee (IOC) \$50,000 grant that funded airfare, insurance, travel stipends and accommodation costs for the FSM Football team while in Port Moresby.

TEAM FSM wishes to thank the Office of the FSM President and the FSM Department of Health and Social Affairs for funding team uniforms and a \$200 stipend for all TEAM FSM athletes and coaches. gold today. Minginfel was not a favourite to win the gold medals. Before the competition started this morning his FSM coach Ronald Etscheit said– "TEAM FSM and I just hope that Manuel will win a medal. We are all very proud of him".

Manuel's first appearance at a Pacific Games was at the Mini Games in Pago Pago in 1997. Since that time, he has competed in every single Pacific Games and Mini Games, winning a

total of 21 gold medals and 6 silver medals. The FSM National Olympic Committee is working with the Pacific Games Council to confirm that Minginfel now holds the record for winning the most gold medals by an athlete in the history of the Pacific Games.

Minginfel was awarded a Rio 2016 Olympic Games athlete training scholarship in January 2015 and will continue to try to qualify for next year's Olympic Games.

Australian Grant awarded for Pohnpei Fitness Center renovation project

The Australian Embassy recently awarded a \$100,000 grant to the Pohnpei Athletics Club, which is a non-profit organization that was created to renovate the old Pohnpei Fitness Center located in Nan Peper, Pwunsoh and start new innovate sports and health programs there. To date, this is the largest grant awarded by the Australian Embassy for such a project and renovation has already begun, which will hopefully be the first grant for future phases at the location.

The first phase of this project is to first renovate the dilapidated fitness center into a new gym complete with new locker rooms and a conference room. The next phase is to bring in equipment for new sports programs such as cross-fit, wrestling, boxing, and an area for women related programs such as dance, yoga, Zumba and other exercises. Other future plans with the center will be to improve the parking lot and fence, make the center handicap accessible, and make the overall project a sustainable green-project by installing solar panels and other clean energy equipment, thereby making this fitness center a model for all others in the region. The Pohnpei Athletics Club hopes

to find other interested donors to help fund those future projects.

Awak Elementary School Holds Groundbreaking Ceremony

Awak Elementary School is one step closer to improving coastal protection at the school site, an important priority determined by Awak community.

Today (Wednesday 1 July 2015), disaster risk management partners held a groundbreaking ceremony for installation of a new gabion seawall at Awak Elementary School.

Gerald Zackios, North Pacific Regional Office Director and Noa Tokavou, Officer Disaster Risk Management from the Secretariat of the Pacific Community (SPC), Principal Ramirez from Awak Elementary School, Lino Amor, PTA president of Awak Elementary School, Deacon Donre of Awak Catholic Church, Eugene Joseph, Executive Director, Kesdy-Ray Ladore, Jason Cammarano, and Julius Fischer from Conservation Society of Pohnpei (CSP), and Canita Rilometo-Swigert and Kate McDermott from IOM attended the groundbreaking event, surrounded by pupils.

The project is funded by the European Union through the SPC-managed Building Safety and Resilience in the Pacific (BRSP) project. In Awak, it is implemented by the International Organization for Migration (IOM) and the Conservation Society of Pohnpei (CSP) with

coordination and support from the Pohnpei Climate Change Outreach Committee (PCCOC).

IOM, CSP, and PCCOC members conducted a climate change outreach and Hazard Vulnerability Capacity Mapping exercise at the Nan Awak Catholic Mission Nahs in early October 2013. At this session, community members from Awak Powe, Awak Pah, Kepin Awak, Pohn Awak, Awak, and Tipwen Kehpei, developed their community action plan for both short and long term climate impacts. Awak Elementary School caters to all of these villages.

The school is located on the lagoon side and exposed to the ocean. While there is a seawall in place, it is incomplete. Based on the threats posed to the school by sea level rise and coastal erosion, community members listed the school as one of their most vulnerable sites.

IOM, CSP, and PCCOC members returned to the Nan Awak Catholic Mission Nahs on 21 June 2015 to update community members about progress to improve coastal protection at their school and to conduct an informational session on resilient coastal management. Construction of the gabion seawall will commence in July and is expected to be completed by November 2015.



New book highlights Micronesia, Pacific island challenges



Majuro — Corruption, reliance on donor-driven aid and consultants, dwindling rural populations and burgeoning urban centers that stress the ability of governments to provide education and health services, an epidemic of non-communicable diseases as lifestyles change, and battles with countries outside the region for control of fisheries and deep sea resources — these are among contemporary island issues that are the focus of a just-published book on the Pacific islands.

“Idyllic No More: Pacific Island Climate, Corruption and Development Dilemmas” is a new book released over the weekend by Giff Johnson, the editor of the Marshall Islands Journal, the weekly newspaper published in Majuro.

The book is “a bracing look at where the islands are today, and what it will take to build a future of hope and opportunity for islanders across the region,” said veteran Oceania journalist Floyd K. Takeuchi. Johnson “frames a view of the Pacific islands that’s characterized by hard-edge realism while offering a way forward,” Takeuchi said.

The 153-page book is published by CreateSpace and is available through amazon.com.

In a series of essays about the looming climate threat and island responses, sustainable development and the region’s multi-billion dollar tuna industry, the U.S. nuclear test legacy in the Marshall Islands, and the impact of out-migration, “Idyllic No More” focuses on the often difficult problems and choices facing the Pacific islands today.

“I’m hopeful that educators will see the new book as a useful resource for stimulating discussion in high school and college classes on the key issues of the day, and that it offers an interesting read for people who want to delve more deeply into the challenges facing the region,” said Johnson.

Bikini Atoll Trust Liaison and Microwave Films president Jack Niedenthal said because of the author’s “decades of experienced reporting about the Marshall Islands and Micronesia, his inside look at the world of island governments and people is both enlightening and thought provoking.”

North Pacific negotiators prepare for Paris climate change talks

A crucial workshop to prepare three North Pacific nations for their participation in negotiations at the upcoming UN Climate Change Conference opens in Pohnpei today, supported by the Government of Germany.

Senior officials from Palau, Federated States of Micronesia (FSM) and the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI) were updated on the current status of climate change negotiations and assisted to analyze the draft Paris treaty text and to prepare proposals for the 21st UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) Conference of Parties in Paris (COP 21) by end of this year.

Climate change is a real and serious threat to the livelihoods and sustainable development of Pacific people and the Pacific Islands will continue to call for a significant reduction in the rate of global greenhouse gas emissions to prevent further long term impacts.

The workshop is hosted by the Government of FSM and jointly organized by the Secretariat of the Pacific Community (SPC), Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) GmbH, Secretariat of the Pacific Environment Programme (SPREP) and Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat (PIFS).

The UNFCCC process for developing a protocol, another legally-binding instrument or an agreed outcome with legal force under the Convention is complex and challenging for many small states.

European countries, among them Germany, are standing side by side with Pacific Island governments to achieve a positive outcome at the climate change negotiations, the Programme Director and Senior Adviser for GIZ, Dr Wulf Killmann, said.

“The stakes are high for Pacific nations so there’s been anticipation in this intensive training for negotiators which complements ongoing financial and technical support to strengthen their resilience against the impacts of climate change,” said Dr Killmann, the workshop’s moderator.

“It’s important that the international community comes to an ambitious, comprehensive climate change agreement at COP 21 at the end of the year,” he said.

The financial and technical support of industrialized nations is essential for small island nations, which are among the most vulnerable to climate change, the Director of SPC’s North Pacific Regional office, Gerald Zackios, said.

“Importantly, the workshop has improved the participants’ understanding of climate finance, including the Green Climate Fund and the concept of Intended Nationally Determined Contributions and the related preparation process in the North Pacific,” Mr Zackios said.

Around 30 participants were expected at the workshop which ran until Wednesday (15 July). It was made possible with funding from Germany’s Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Ministry for the Environment, Nature Conservation, Building and Nuclear Safety.
